### September’s Builder Theme - I am a Builder when I am Building with Enthusiasm

Being an enthusiastic person take practice. Here are seven tips to use to practice being an enthusiastic person.

### CARPOOL—It's A Team Thing! (Week 2 of 3)

Parents—so many of you are doing all you can to make carpool run as smoothly and safely as possible! THANK YOU! Our very best scenario is a carpool where EVERY parent picks up their child at the curb. This would be the safest and most efficient system for everyone. It may not be the most efficient for YOUR family...but when we look at the whole school and all of the families and what's best for EVERYONE, using the carpool system as designed is the very best way. We have wanted, for several years, to take some data on how long it takes to go through carpool, looking at arrival times, number of students you are picking up and even if your carpool number group makes a difference. We will be doing this “research” over the next couple weeks. Thanks in advance for your participation. As reminders:

- ⇒ -Please do not park on Crystal Avenue. This makes it dangerous for our walkers, is an annoyance to our neighbors, and complicates the traffic flow for parents trying to exit the parking lot. Please park in a regular parking spot.
- ⇒ -The north parking area nearest the exit will be blocked off by cones. Please avoid this area as it blocks the view of oncoming traffic for cars leaving the parking lot.
- ⇒ -If you *must* park at the north end of the building, consider backing into the parking spots. Backing out onto Crystal Avenue is hazardous during this heavy traffic time.
- ⇒ -Ask your children to be watching for you so that once you pull up to the curb they can load quickly (and you do not have to wait for staff to try and hunt them down!)

To all of you who are making this work—thank you so much! We are in this together—and your enthusiasm and support makes this part of being at a charter school so much better!

**Parents! Please be careful when driving on Crystal Avenue. Police are monitoring the stop signs and have asked us to inform our parents to come to a complete stop at the signs. If there are any children waiting to cross, they will have the right of way. Please wait for them to safely cross before proceeding through the stop sign. APA parents are AWESOME! Help keep all of our children safe in the neighborhood!**

### Reading University in Elementary—What's It All About? (Week 4 of 4)

Reading University, often referred to as “RU”, is a program of *student independent reading*. The purpose of the program is to encourage students to read regularly, outside of school hours, and expose them to good literature. When students become enthusiastic readers, not only do they build their vocabulary and imaginations and understanding of the world, they most often see increased academic success in every subject. Time spent in independent reading has been shown to be a defining indicator in a student's academic success.

Reading University is a graded subject in elementary and will be part of your student's report card. The grade is based purely upon the number of books that your student reads each term. It is reported to the teacher by turning in the list of books (Title, Author and Parent Signature to say it was read) each term. We call this the RU Log. You should find this paper in your student's gray RU folder in their docket. If you cannot find it, please ask the teacher for another copy.



Each grade requires a different number of books to be completed for each term:

- Kindergarten—8 books per term
- 1st Grade—8 books per term
- 2nd Grade—6 books per term
- 3rd Grade—5 books per term
- 4th Grade—3 books per term
- 5th Grade—3 books per term
- 6th Grade—3 books per term

Books are selected from the Reading University book list. The RU book list is most easily accessed from the school website: [www.americanprep.org](http://www.americanprep.org). Click on our campus—West Valley I-- at the bottom of the page. Click on the “resources” tab at the top, then “Reading University”. The book lists can be viewed by grade, or books can be searched by title or author. If you need help with this, please ask your teacher or the Academic Office and we can help you.

Some other important points about Reading University:

- Students can read books that are at or above their grade level or one grade level below. (3rd graders, for example, can read books on the 2nd grade list and up)
- Students can have books read to them. This is true for not just our beginning readers in K and 1st, but students in all grades. For example, reading a book from the 6th grade list together as a family could count for each of your students.
- Books on tape are okay to use for Reading University. It is especially good to have a copy of the book as well so that the student may read along with the narrator.
- Books that are not on the RU list can also be enjoyed, but only one per term can count toward the RU reading requirements.
- Books can be checked out from the public library. Books from the RU list are also available to be checked out from the classroom library.
- At the end of each term, students will have the opportunity to earn small prizes at the “RU store” for completing or doubling their RU goal.

If you have suggestions for excellent books to be added to the RU list, we would love your input. If you are interested in being a parent who does volunteer time reading the books that have been recommended, we can use that help too! If you have any questions—please, please ask. Reading University is the subject that every student should be earning an A+ in, yet it is the subject that is most failed at our campus. Get your students off to a great start with their independent reading!

### Parent Emails

Our teachers are using parent emails to keep families updated on student progress and upcoming projects and events. We ask that all parents ensure they have a current email address at American Prep so they can receive these important messages. Every week Mrs. Hernandez emails the Newsletter to each family. ### **Fresh Fruits and Vegetables – HONEYCRISP APPLES, BABY KIWI & CAPE GOOSEBERRIES**

Honeycrisp apples were first developed in the 1960's at the University of Minnesota where they were bred with the intent of creating an apple that could tolerate Minnesota's cold weather. Honeycrisp apples have a yellow background covered with a red to pink blush. Their creamy white flesh is exceptionally crisp and aromatic. A balanced content of sugar and acid gives Honeycrisp apples a pleasant sweet-tart flavor that varies in strength depending upon the maturity of the apple. Medium to large in size, an average Honeycrisp apple contains about 80 calories. They are rich in dietary fiber, specifically pectin which has been shown to reduce cholesterol and slow glucose metabolism in diabetics. They also contain Vitamins A and C, most of which is found in the skin.

Baby kiwi is very similar to its parent fruit the Kiwi. There are a few differences. The most obvious is the size (hence the name baby). Baby kiwi is grown in many different regions throughout the world, some of which are now grown in our own country right in California. Another major difference with baby kiwi is that it is virtually hairless. There is no peeling required before eating. The fruit is eaten just as you see it (Whole). The taste is very similar to the normal kiwi and might have a tad more of a tang to it. Baby kiwi is also known as a 'kiwi berry'. It is grown on vines. It is best to eat when it begins to soften.

Cape gooseberries are available most of the year. Supplies are imported from Colombia, South America where they grow wild and are gathered. Resembling a Chinese lantern, the gooseberry is wrapped in a thin, papery, inflated skin. These very tart, piquant fruits turn from a pale green to an amber or gold color as they ripen and offer a flavor similar to a gooseberry or a tart green grape. Cape gooseberries are a good source of vitamin C and provide dietary fiber
